So, who was St. Valentine? There were three but the saint associated with February 14 was a celibate dragged out into the streets of Rome in AD 269 and clubbed before being beheaded for his faith on the orders of Emperor Claudius. His bones are said to be preserved in the Carmelite church in Dublin and his feast day was chosen as the lover's day because it was close to the pagan fertility festival of Lupercalia.

The earliest written Valentine message recorded is a poem written by Charles, Duke of Orleans and sent to his wife from prison after the battle of Agincourt in 1415.

Microbiologist student Bruce Fergusson said it with science when he gave his wife, Helen, a card made from 500,000 million bacteria he had grown to form the words "I Love You".

One Valentine's Day morning, exuberant Michael O'Connor threw his arms around the first customer to walk into his shop and kissed her cheek. He was jailed for behaviour likely to casue a breach of peace, but ten years later, in 1917, the customer died and left him £20,000. He was the only man who had kissed him.

One demonstrative swain paid to have spelt out 3 feet high letters on a giant telecaster in Leicester Square: "To Joyce. Be My Valentine". It lasted all day, but did not win George his Joyce.

By the 17th Century, Valentine messages were written on gift-edged paper, and the first cards were printed commercially in 1820.

Napoleon's Empress Eugenie was given a jewel encrusted Valentine card worth £4,500. And Aristotle Onassis sent Maria Callas a diamond and emeral studded gold card wrapped in black mink coat worth £180,000.
