


It is a great privilege to my wife, Bente and myself to convey to all members of the FAD my warmest greetings on the occasion of the 85th Philippine Independence Anniversary.


Having been in office for little less than one year, I am happy to observe the close cooperation between the Filipinos living in Denmark and also their

# PHILIPPINE INDEPENDENCE A HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

When the silken Tricolor, our red-white and blue Filipino flag was raised to the majestic strains of the 'Marcha Nacional Filipina' (composed by Julian Felipe and up to this day, our National Anthem, the Pambansang Awit) that sunny Sunday afternoon of June 12th 1898, foremost in the minds of those present must have been the blood, the sweat and the tears of our forebears that made possible the historic moment at Kawit, Cavite. There were tears in not a few of the <u>revolucionarios</u>' eyes as they listened to the proclamation of Independence read by Ambrosio Riansares Bautista.

Indeed ours is a long history of struggle for freedom from foreign domination. We remember Lapu-lapu, chieftain of Cebu who refused to make a compact with the Portuguese explorer sent by King Philip of Spain to circummavigate the globe in search of spices and trade. Successful at making peace with <u>datus</u> and <u>rajas</u> of nearby islands, Magellan was met in Cebu with hostility; the battle of Mactan was waged, Magellan slain, and the native Lapu-lapu earned for posterity the honor of being the first Filipino freedom fighter.

40 years later, the Spanish crown successfully conquered the islands with the Legazpi expedition in 1571 thus annexing the archipelago as Spanish territory for the next 333 years. The Hispanization process of tribute collection and forced labor sowed seeds of resentment early on. A series of revolts erupted in the far reaches of Spanish rule during the 17th and 18th centuries. Some of them were extensive and protracted like the Dagohov revolt in Bohol which lasted for 80 years! The Igorots of Luzon maintained their independence for 300 years, perhaps not surprising from a people who built the 8th wonder of the World, the magnificient Banaue Rice Terraces without slave labor! To this day, there are still parts of Mindanao that have never been colonized by either Spanish or the Americans.

Discontent among the Filipino clergy was to be a focal point in the growing national ferment. Brother Pule (Apolinario dela Cruz) of Tayabas (Quezon Province) was to hold captive the entire Fort Santiago in 1843 when the friars denied recognition of the religious confraternity that he had established. When the native priests Gomez, Burgos and Zamora were garroted in 1872 for complicity in the Cavity mutiny by the authorities, we see another impetus to the nationalist movement. By the time the Spaniards subjected our national hero, Dr. Jose P. Rizal to a firing squad in Bagumbayan (what is now Rizal Park) at dawn of December 30,1896 as a result of his incendiary novel, Noli Me Tangere, the Philippine nation had been a-borning for some time.

Andres Bonifacio and his <u>Katipuneros</u> had rejected the Reform movement of Rizal and the other <u>ilustrados</u> (scions of the privileged classes who had the means to be educated in Spain and Europe) in favor of a more effective means of securing change: armed uprising. It was Bonifacio, the Tondo warehouseman who founded the secret society, a truly mass organisation, the <u>Katipunan</u> which led the successful struggle against Spain.

A rival leader, Emilio Aguinaldo of Cavite, signed the Pact of Biak-na-Bato with the Spanish before leaving on self-exile to Hongkong, but first having declared the Revolution ended and imposing death on those who didn't heed the decree. Bonifacio and his men felt that the Pact was a betrayal and continued the fighting. This power struggle was to cost Bonifacio his life at the hands of the Katipumeros from Cavite, later on.

The advent of the Spanish-American war saw the return of the exiles from Hongkong. On May 31st, Aguinaldo signed a Proclamation of war on Spain signifying the start of the General Uprising. By first week of June, the whole country was practically under Filipino control. Some 5000 Spanish soldiers were captured and 10,000 rifles and assorted arms collected. It was a jubilant

Kapitan Miong sorrounded by his men (among them Apolinario Mabini, the Sublime Paralytic who advised Aguinaldo) who unfurled the flag of fine silk painstakingly handsewn by the Filipino women in Hongkong that historic Sunday 85 years ago. More than three centuries of subjugation was over! It was the first time that a colonial power had been overthrown in Asia; it was the first time that a modern republic was set up in that area.


The struggle was to continue beyond that date, however. For while the clear Filipino victory over the Spanish forces should have established us as Masters in our own House at last, this was to be short-lived. The Americans, already in the country, first ostensibly to help the Filipinos defeat the Spanish, were actually preparing to take over the islands to realise their economic expansion in the Far East. Manila was surrendered to the Americans by the Spanish in a mockbattle. By Feb. 4, 1899 it was a shooting war between the troops of Dewey and Aguinaldo's katipumeros, which finally led to the capture in March 23, 1901 of the latter at Palanan, Isabela. Fifty years were to pass before the new colonisers would give what had already been a reality at Kawitindependence - back to the Filipino people and first, after a third invader, this time an Asian nation, Japan, occupied the islands for 4 years during World War II.

'Freedom's just another word for nothing left to lose... and nothing ain't worth nothing but it's free..." are the cynical lyrics to a blues tune from this generation. We are still part of that continuing postscript to the tableau at Kawit. As a subjugated people for almost four centuries, we seem favored in possessing a cheery disposition and affability that has helped us bear our suffering well. Our ebullience is often misconstrued as subservience by those who aren't familiar with the Filipino soul. History has shown that we can overthrow the yoke of tyranny.

On a day like today when we cherish the memory of all those before us who have given their lives such that we could have a Filipino nation, let us unite in this Prayer and Cheer:

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
